This year, 292 students received scholarships. In addition to scholarships, extra support was provided in the form of bicycle kits, holiday gifts, and counselling.

In 2018, the ESP will continue to provide crucial support to students in desperate need so they can stay in school and build a brighter future. In addition, we aim to strengthen partnerships with local partners, enhance parental involvement, and improve our internal database management.

AND EVALUATION

Because CNCF is directly responsible for funding and programme management, we conduct regular monitoring and evaluation activities. Regular updates of children's progress in school and college are collected and timely support is provided when necessary. Prior to enrolment and as issues arise, our social worker and programme manager conduct home visits. Weekly internal meetings are conducted for CNCF staff to discuss programme-related issues and updates. Monthly reports and semi-annual reports are sent by CNCF staff to the Board of Management and an Annual Review of the programme is sent to all stakeholders.

PROGRAMME BACKGROUND

We believe education is crucial to the growth and development of every child and is a key factor that can help break the poverty cycle. Without education, children cannot transcend the social sphere into which they are born. Education gives children a chance, a sense of worth, hope, and an opportunity for change. In the short-term, school provides a refuge from danger and poverty; in the long-term, it is how a child can permanently overcome barriers.

Accessing affordable education remains an obstacle for many of Vietnam's poorest families. By law, students are not required to pay tuition fees at the primary school level in public schools; however, other costs, such as transportation, uniforms, and learning materials, and informal fees set by schools or communes at the local level can make even primary education prohibitively expensive. Many children from poor households cannot go to school or complete their education due to economic constraints. Instead, many must work to help support their families. Often, families are unaware of the long-term value of education, and thus, children do not get the support they need to stay in school.

We established the Child Sponsorship Programme in 1996 to help children stay in school. Recognising that more support was needed to ensure that children continue their education, we established the Education Scholarship Programme (ESP) in 2002 to provide scholarships to children whose families are unable to afford schooling with the aim of ensuring that children can remain in the educational system. The financial support we provide to our children covers school fees. The ESP offers scholarships to eligible students from Ho Chi Minh City and several rural provinces in the Mekong Delta region. We also provide additional support when appropriate in the form of career counselling, life skills training, and provision of computers, laptops, and bicycles. To date, ESP has provided financial support to more than 3,000 disadvantaged students.





OUR YEAR

In 2017, 292 students received scholarships through the Education Support Programme. All ESP students received fixed scholarships. The amount is fixed based on education level and province. All disbursement activities were completed on schedule.

In addition to scholarships, extra support was provided in the form of bicycle kits (2 students), holiday gifts (12 students), and counselling (32 students).


PROGRAMME ACTIVITIES

EDUCATION SUPPORT


Providing financial assistance for education is the main activity of the ESP.

In 2017, 292 children from Ho Chi Minh City and two provinces in the Mekong Delta—Kien Giang and Long An—were enrolled. Children attending primary, secondary, and high school as well as those attending university, college, and vocational training received scholarships.

SCHOLARSHIP DISBURSEMENT

In 2017, all ESP students received fixed scholarships based on education level and the province in which they attend school.

ESP staff in cooperation with the officers of local partners organised scholarship disbursement ceremonies for all children enrolled in the programme. This gave the team the opportunity to meet the students and their parents/guardians, to talk, to listen, to gain valuable insights into the difficulties the families face, and offer timely help and advice.

Furthermore, some networking and team-building activities were included in the scholarship disbursement ceremonies for students attending college, university, or vocational training with the aim of building a network for these students to enable them to improve their soft skills, especially their communication and team work skills.



MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The ESP team monitors the family situation, social environment, and economic conditions of each programme beneficiary. They also assess any risks the children might face. Based on this information, intervention and support plans are put in place. The team tries to arrange frequent meetings with parents, phone calls, and other means of communication to follow-up regularly with all ESP scholars. The team also conducts home visits when financially feasible.

Another important aspect of programme monitoring is regular follow-up with schools and families for updates on academic performance. Our staff work closely with local partners and students to collect school reports.

In 2017, over 80% of ESP students achieved academic marks of average or above. It is important to note that our children come from homes that do not provide a conducive learning environment. In cases of poor academic performance, our staff attempts to ascertain the reasons and offer additional support.

ADDITIONAL SUPPORT

Bicycles

Children enrolled in the ESP also benefit from other CNCF programmes. In 2017, our Bicycle Support Programme provided bicycles to two children in the ESP who faced difficulties getting to and from school.

Holiday Gifts

Additional support during the Vietnamese New Year, Tet, was provided to 12 children whose families were facing extreme financial hardship.

Counselling

This year, 32 students received counselling from our programme staff.



OUR STORIES

Doctor in Training

Bich* was in our Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) from 2004 to 2016. Thanks to the support of her parents, her sister, her sponsor, and CNCF, Bich performed very well in school. After completing ninth grade, she passed the entrance exam to one of the most prestigious high schools in Vietnam. In 2013, she passed the difficult entrance exam to get into university to study medicine. Her CSP sponsor was very proud of all her accomplishments, but due to personal reasons, was unable to continue supporting her.

Bich's parents were also unable to finance the final year of her university education. Because of her stellar academic record and personal hardships, we transferred Bich to the ESP so she could focus on her studies during her senior year. Immediately after her graduation in 2017, she was recruited to work at one of the biggest children's hospitals in Vietnam!

Long-Term Commitment Pays Off

Thanh* has been in ESP since 2006 when he was in fifth grade. When we first met Thanh, he and his family were in a difficult situation because his father had passed away four years prior. Thanh and his brother were at high risk of dropping out of school. Their mother was an unskilled worker and she had to juggle numerous jobs to keep the family afloat. The ESP allowed Thanh to stay in school.

Thanh has excelled in school and became the only member of his family to attend university. After four years of hard work, he graduated with a degree in Electrical and Electronic Engineering Technology. After graduation, Thanh was recruited to work for a foreign company. His career is off to a great start and he will undoubtedly be able to provide for himself and his family.



Overcoming Obstacles

Nhu* and her family lived on the outskirts of Ho Chi Minh City. Nhu's father worked as a motorbike-taxi driver and her mother was a babysitter. Their incomes from these jobs were low and unstable. As a result, it was extremely difficult for them to provide for their three children. Their lives became even more difficult when they were forced to move to make way for a government construction project. Nhu's parents came to CNCF in search of financial support to help their children stay in school.

Since 2004, Nhu has received support from the ESP. She recently graduated from university where she studied banking. She secured a job with a foreign bank in Ho Chi Minh City. Nhu's success would not have been possible without her hard work and the financial support provided by the Education Scholarship Programme.
