BACKGROUND

CNCF's Capital Projects (CAP) were established with an aim of offering vital support to vulnerable children and families. This support is provided through a range of initiatives, including the construction of new kindergartens and child-friendly libraries, water supply facilities including water tanks, water wells and water purification plants; low-interest revolving loans; and other facilities beneficial to communities living in abject poverty

BENEFICIARIES

Children who lack access to early childhood education and those studying in substandard facilities, communities with limited or no access to basic education services, individuals living in poverty without access to clean water and related facilities, and families aiming to establish or expand small businesses for improving their living conditions but facing challenges in accessing financial capital

LOCAL PARTNERS

Department of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs of Hau Giang, Dong Thap, and Kien Giang Provinces; Hau Giang Union of Friendship Organisations; and Women's Union of Son Kien Commune, Kien Giang Province

CNCF ACCOUNTABILITY

CNCF is responsible for the financing of microfinance loans, one-time financing of construction and/or installation costs of kindergartens, water tanks, and libraries, as well as monitoring and reporting to donors

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

CNCF conducts preliminary visits to assess the needs of communities and families. Throughout the construction phase, a minimum of three inspection trips are facilitated to monitor the progress of new builds. Documentation including invoices and monthly reports is collected, and an annual report is made available to all stakeholders

OUR YEAR

This year, CNCF's Capital Projects continued to provide support to communities in poverty-stricken and remote rural areas of southern Vietnam, ensuring access to quality education by establishing child-friendly libraries, implementing clean water supply solutions, and offering financial aid to support the establishment of small businesses.

OUR YEAR

Water Tank Programme

In many poverty-stricken communities in the Mekong Delta region of Vietnam, utilising rainwater is a readily available solution to accessing clean water. However, numerous families lack proper containers to store rainwater, forcing them to resort to unsafe water from contaminated canals and rivers. posing serious health risks to children and their families. In addition, many children and families spend hours and resources searching for and collecting water, impacting their economic opportunities educational access. Through CNCF's Water Tank Programme, families are provided with sustainable water sources via water tank and well installations. This initiative has substantially improved community health, reduced waterborne diseases and infant mortality.

CNCF's Noble Libraries

This year, CNCF achieved a significant milestone as we successfully completed two Noble Libraries at Long Binh Primary School Province. which serve as crucial infrastructure, enhancing the students' education quality by providing access to a fostering a conducive learning environment. The Noble Libraries not only aim to enhance the overall educational experience of learning, contributing significantly to overall community development.



Microfinance Loan Programme

CNCF's Microfinance Loan Programme addresses the needs of families who lack access to bank loans as commercial banks often limit loans to vulnerable farming communities due to the associated high risks. Since 1997, we have partnered with local organisations to offer low-interest, collateral-free revolving loans to individuals, primarily women. These loans support various microenterprises, such as rice farming, cash crop cultivation, livestock breeding, and small businesses like coffee shops, bakeries, and motorbike repair shops. The programme aims to empower families in poverty, leading to improved financial stability and self-sufficiency, and ensuring their children's education.

Tay Ninh Residential For Visually Impaired Children Refurbishment Project

Following an extensive renovation generously funded by Anonymous Donor (VN) and St. James's Place Charitable Foundation (UK), the Tay Ninh Residential Centre for Visually Impaired Children underwent significant facility improvements. The library was expanded and upgraded, now housing an extensive collection of Braille books, audio books, and learning resources that encourage a passion for reading and independent learning. The computer room was renovated to facilitate interactive learning and technology skill acquisition, and the music room was restored with various instruments to help children foster an interest in music, stimulates creativity, and enhances auditory skills. Additionally, the Tay Ninh Centre now features a more spacious and well-equipped classroom, designed to further enhance in progress on a recently installed child-friendly playground, aimed at promoting physical activity and fostering social interaction among the children. These ongoing renovations are designed to create an environment conducive to the holistic development of the children residing at the centre.

Sunshine Homes Refurbishment Project

In 2022, CNCF's Sunshine Homes, a residential facility for vulnerable children, underwent extensive refurbishment to maintain its high-quality care thanks to UPS (VN) and Anonymous Donor (VN). The refurbishments included repainting the gates and walls to create a more inspiring atmosphere. Safety and aesthetics were also ensured with repainted staircases and handrails. To improve the water supply and support the children's hygiene needs, a new public water system and bathroom were installed. A new computer room was also established, further providing the children with academic support and broader learning opportunities. Additionally, home fitness equipment was introduced to promote physical activity and a healthy lifestyle. With the successful completion of these refurbishments, Sunshine Homes continues to offer a safe and nurturing environment, providing comprehensive support including academic education, vocational training, healthcare, and psychological assistance to vulnerable children at risk of violence, exploitation, and trafficking.

An Educational Transformation

This year, an inspiring transformation took place within the lively community of Long Tri Secondary School, situated in Hau Giang Province in the Mekong Delta region of Vietnam. A once underutilised library has now become a thriving centre for learning, exploration, and personal growth, benefiting the school's 534 students. This shift was driven by the vision of creating a safe space where young students can explore, broaden their knowledge, and foster a profound passion for reading.

The impact of the library has been truly remarkable, with a noteworthy 60% increase in usage compared to the previous year, highlighting the growing importance of the library within the school community. The introduction of book management software and a book coding system has streamlined the process of searching and borrowing books, making it more user-friendly. This, in turn, facilitates students' access to the resources they need, enhancing their engagement with the library. The library has become much more than just a room filled with books; it has become a place of knowledge, dreams, and unlimited potential, offering a stimulating environment in which students find nourishment for their curiosity, connect with diverse perspectives, and advance their educational journey.

The success of the Long Tri Secondary School Library is a testament to the transformative impact of accessible learning resources in shaping young minds, enriching not only students' academic lives but also setting a compelling example for other educational institutions to follow.
