BACKGROUND	The Child Sponsorship Programme in Mongolia was established as an emergency response to the extreme poverty and hardship that engulfed the nation following the withdrawal of the Soviet Union in 1990 and its consequential drastic socioeconomic changes, which left thousands of children and their families struggling for safety and survival. Child sponsorship empowers children and their communities to lift themselves out of poverty by alleviating financial pressure that enable students to continue and further their education as well as affording their essential needs and creating greater employment opportunities. The Programme connects vulnerable children and their families to people from around the world who want to be part of a rewarding journey to create lasting change in the lives of those most in need, by providing them with the means to access basic necessities. #### MONITORING AND EVALUATION

CNCF is fully responsible for programme funding, management, monitoring and evaluation

CNCF Social Workers conduct annual home visits to Child Sponsorship Programme children and their families to assess their needs, challenges and living conditions. Updates are also provided at sponsorship distribution days. Reports on the progress of the sponsored child are sent to each sponsor along with a letter written by their child. Internal meetings are conducted for CNCF staff to discuss programme related challenges and updates. A monthly report is completed by our CNCF Project Manager and an annual report is made available to all stakeholders.

# OUR YEAR

In 2022, CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) continued providing financial and social assistance to families living in with abject poverty. The monthly financial sponsorship covers the costs of education including tuition fees, school supplies, uniforms and transportation to and from school as well as food, clothes, and extracurricular activities when needed. Children and their families also receive healthcare, psychological support, and personal development opportunities.

The ongoing challenges posed by the rising costs of consumer goods continue to affect the lives of numerous vulnerable communities in Mongolia. As many families struggle to afford basic necessities such as food and daily essentials due to their financial strains, CNCF remains unwavering in our commitment to addressing these fundamental needs. During this period, our compassionate sponsors have played a crucial role in alleviating the immediate needs of these families. We extend our heartfelt gratitude on behalf of the hundreds of children we serve.



# OUR STORIES

### A Life Transformed Through Sponsorship

Udval\* was enrolled in CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme when she was 6 years old. Her father battled severe alcohol addiction and was prone to domestic violence. For their safety, Udval's mother decided to leave her husband and settled as a single mother. The family faced significant hardships when Udval was diagnosed with congenital diabetes, leaving her mother with no other option but to sell their ger (a traditional Mongolian home) to afford medical treatment for Udval.

For 16 years, the monthly financial support through the Child Sponsorship Programme became the family's lifeline, enabling Udval to attend school and pursue further education, and assisting her mother in covering their basic living expenses. Understanding the family's need of a stable and reliable shelter, CNCF's Give-a-Ger Programme, with the financial support of Udval's sponsor, provided them with a fully-furnished home of their own. Additionally, CNCF Social Workers recognised the importance of Udval's healthcare and connected her with an external organisation that provided funding for her diabetes treatments. Following her graduation from university, Udval embarked on her career path as a Social Worker, inspired by the kind CNCF Social Workers who had been there for her during her most challenging times, consistently providing emotional and social support that enriched her life. Today, Udval is a highly qualified professional working at one of Ulaanbaatar's most reputable orphanages, bringing hope and inspiring dreams to the lives of many vulnerable children.

"When I started working and gave my first month's salary to my mother, she cried tears of joy, reminding me that my success was only made possible by the trust and support of a group of kind people. ### **Rising Above Challenges**

"My name is Nomin<sup>\*</sup>, and I am 20 years old, currently living with my grandparents and aunt. I joined CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme in 2010 when my family was facing extremely challenging conditions. At that time, my grandfather earned a meagre income by collecting scraps from a dumpsite, while my grandmother was unemployed, and my aunt couldn't work due to her intellectual condition. I was still in elementary school.

Through the Child Sponsorship Programme, our burdens were alleviated, and I was able to realise and pursue my dreams. The monthly sponsorship funds helped to cover the costs of my education, healthcare, and personal development opportunities. I began participating in school activities and competitions, earning recognition such as the "Talented Student" gold medal from the city during my senior high school year. After successfully graduating from high school, with the continued support of CNCF through the Educational Scholarship Programme, I received tuition fees assistance to study Security and Law Enforcement at a university. I have been working hard and have consistently been acknowledged as one of the top students in my faculty.

I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to my generous sponsor and the Foundation's dedicated team who have supported me throughout the years. You have shone a bright light to my life and made a significant impact that has transformed me from a shy and scared child into a confident and determined individual. Thank you."
