BACKGROUND

CNCF's Healthcare Programme was established with an aim to provide the children in our care and vulnerable children professional medical check-ups, treatments and emergency care. On-site treatments for mild to moderate health conditions are provided by CNCF Doctors, whilst children with complex conditions are referred to a secondary or tertiary level hospital for specialised diagnosis and treatment. Financial assistance is provided to ensure children are able to receive the emergency treatments they desperately needed. Additionally, CNCF's Psychology Programme is dedicated to addressing the emotional well-being of vulnerable children

Through a tailored approach, the programme offers a range of psychological services tailored to the individual's age and specific emotional characteristics. By fostering a sense of empowerment and providing tools for self-reflection, children are equipped to enhance their self-esteem and develop crucial skills for emotional regulation and self-control

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

CNCF Programme Management Team closely monitors the health and well-being progress of each child and provides timely support

when needed. Frequent internal meetings are conducted for CNCF staff to discuss programme related issues and updates. Monthly reports are sent to CNCF's Director of Operations, and an annual report is made available to all stakeholders. Throughout the year, regular psychological trainings and counselling are organised and progress is evaluated



PROGRAMME DESCRIPTION

On average in Mongolia, one in three adolescents face emotional or behavioural challenges, primarily stemming from persistent food, housing, and income insecurities, as well as the pervasive effects of poverty. These circumstances significantly impact the mental well-being of children, particularly those lacking access to basic necessities like proper nutrition, clean water, and healthcare services. In addition, urban areas, notably the country's capital city Ulaanbaatar, struggle with severe air pollution, posing substantial health risks to residents. The influx of migrants from rural areas further strains the city's already stretched healthcare system, while the harsh winter conditions exacerbate the vulnerability of impoverished children to various health ailments and life-threatening situations.

CNCF's Healthcare Programme - since 1997, the Programme has provided the children in CNCF's care and disadvantaged children of Mongolia with complimentary and professional medical check-ups, treatments and emergency care. On-site treatments for mild to moderate health conditions are provided by CNCF's Doctors, whilst children with complex conditions are referred to a secondary or tertiary level hospital for specialised diagnosis and treatment. If a child requires emergency treatment, CNCF provides financial assistance that enables the child to receive treatment at a private clinic, not having to wait weeks or months to be seen at a state hospital.

CNCF's Psychology Programme - CNCF started providing psychological services to children in 2015 which expanded into the fully formed Psychology Programme in 2022. Almost all of the children who come into CNCF's care are deeply traumatised and suffering PTSD, all have either suffered or were at high risk of exploitation and abuse. Healing emotional trauma and empowering youth through education and care, is at the core of our work. With little or no access to mental health services in Mongolia due to lack of funding and stigmas that exist surrounding mental health, CNCF's unique mental health team is providing critically needed support by professionals

in this area to some of the most marginalised and distressed communities on our planet.

CNCF's Medical Exchange Programme (MEP) - In 2004, CNCF's Medical Exchange Programme (MEP) was established in partnership with leading paediatric surgeon Professor Martin Corbally, Operation Childlife (OCL) and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. Since then, MEP has brought world-class medical expertise to Vietnam in the form of medical delegations that assess difficult medical cases and perform surgeries that are otherwise unavailable in Vietnam. In 2022, the programme expanded its annual trips to Mongolia where international delegates demonstrate safe surgical, anaesthetic and nursing practice in complex clinical areas and improve standards of care with leading local medical teams.



Ensuring equitable healthcare access for all children, regardless of their circumstances, is fundamental to CNCF's grassroots strategy for poverty alleviation and sustainable community development. In 2023, CNCF remained dedicated to providing essential healthcare services to children under our direct care and vulnerable communities through our Healthcare Programme. Our Psychosocial Programme continued to offer individual psychological counselling, focus group meetings, training, and evaluations. CNCF's Psychology Programme also reached a significant milestone with the implementation of two pilot initiatives: the BayARTai Pilot Programme, which trained specialists in Art Therapy to support children's emotional well-being, impacting 1,000 children in its inaugural year (view full BayARTai Programme summary here). The programme concluded with an International Conference on Childhood Trauma, the first of its kind in Mongolia, attracting experts from Mongolia and across the globe. Additionally, the 'We Are Future Psychologists' Programme successfully trained university students in Psychology, providing hands-on experience and benefiting over 250 children.

In addition, in 2023 CNCF's Medical Exchange Programme in Mongolia facilitated the visit of leading surgeons from abroad, delivering complex surgeries and enhancing the skills of local medical teams.

OUR YEAR

Medical Exchange Programme

In October 2023, a CNCF medical exchange programme in Mongolia took place in partnership with programme partner Operation Childlife (OCL). The primary goal of the trip was to conduct joint surgeries for complex cases and share knowledge regarding the latest advancements in neonatal endoscopic procedures. The programme, focusing on Neonatal and Paediatric surgery at The National Centre for Maternal and Child Health (NCMCH), was a collaborative effort between medical professionals from Ireland, and Bahrain including three general paediatric surgeons, an anaesthetist, and a surgical nurse.

OTHER COMPLEX SURGERIES including cases of diaphragmatic hernia, were also performed with successful recoveries

During the week-long programme, the international team worked with Mongolian counterparts, consulting on 20 surgical cases and successfully performing four joint surgeries, including a notable procedure on a 7-year-old girl with kidney cancer. They also provided post-operative care and shared insights on surgical processes.

This experience fostered discussions on surgical interventions for children, cultural exchange, and knowledge-sharing. Additionally, two of the OCL volunteer team members, presented their cases and insights at an International Seminar alongside teams from Korea and Japan. Over 40 professionals from all 21 provinces of Mongolia

attended this seminar, allowing for the exchange of knowledge and the presentation of cutting-edge surgical methods and technologies.

During this visit, Mongolian and Irish surgeons also generated four different research datasets, compiled by a joint team of Mongolian and OCL professionals, and the establishment of a simulation centre to enhance surgical skills nationwide. The visit not only facilitated the sharing of expertise but also opened the door for Mongolian doctors to engage in clinical research and case studies with support from OCL, marking the beginning of further promising collaborations.

A New Beginning Thanks To Much-Needed Healthcare Assistance

Six-year-old Nandia* is the sister of CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme beneficiary, Amina. Nandia was born with ptosis, a congenital eye condition that significantly impaired her vision and affected her well-being. Due to the family's challenging circumstances, her parents struggled to access the necessary medical treatment, having to face long waits at hospital due to the significant needs in the area. As a result, Nandia's condition worsened with each passing day.

When CNCF Social Workers learned about Nandia's health situation, they immediately referred her to CNCF's Healthcare Programme for further support in making an appointment with an ophthalmologist and provided financial assistance for her treatment. By the time Nandia received her first diagnosis, her vision was severely impaired, forcing her to constantly strain to see. She then underwent a series of specialised eye examinations and received the desperately needed surgery at the National Centre for Maternal and Child Health. The successful surgery corrected her vision, significantly improving her quality of life.

We are grateful for the collaborative efforts among CNCF Social Workers, the CNCF Healthcare team, and the network of healthcare providers in Mongolia, which ensured that Nandia received prompt and effective treatment upon her hospital admission. As Nandia embarks on her school journey and explores the world with clear vision, she can now look forward to a brighter future filled with new opportunities thanks to CNCF's Healthcare Programme.

A Life Transformed Through Psychological Care

Bataa* arrived at CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village in January 2023, along with his siblings. Following the devastating loss of both parents, Bataa and his younger brothers were left to live with their grandmother in the countryside. This sudden and unexpected tragedy shattered Bataa's world, leaving him in a state of profound grief and confusion. The weight of responsibility for his younger siblings fell heavily on him, leading him to view himself as a bad child, feeling helpless and incapable. Upon his arrival at the Ger Village, Bataa showed aggressive behaviour and neglected his siblings. He often took out his anger on younger children and ran away when confronted with issues. He would avoid school, spending his days without motivation or direction.

Recognising his emotional needs, CNCF Psychologists provided Bataa with regular psychological services, including individual and group meetings, as well as psychological training sessions. Over time, Bataa's ability to communicate with other children improved significantly. He began to express himself to our team, make and keep his commitments, and follow the rules at the Ger Village. Bataa also started attending classes actively and paying attention to his studies. His progress was evident as he became more self-expressive and emotionally resilient.

Moreover, Bataa's interest in cricket and football played a crucial role in boosting his self-esteem. When he engaged in sports, he felt more confident and began to dream about his future. Bataa now confidently expresses his ambition to become a famous football player, demonstrating the positive changes in his life and outlook.
