BACKGROUND

The use of defoliants such as Agent Orange during the Vietnam-America War, inadequate access to health education and monitoring, and a lack of medical and nutritional care have contributed to a high level of visual impairment which still persists in Tay Ninh Province today. CNCF's Tay Ninh Residential Centre for Visually Impaired Children (TNRC) functions as both a residential and educational centre. providing children with holistic long-term residential care, nutrition support, healthcare, academic education, rehabilitation, personal empowerment, vocational and life skills training, and recreational activities. The Centre can accommodate up to 65 visually impaired children and young adults

BENEFICIARIES

Children and young adults (ages 5-22) with visual impairments and multiple disabilities such as hearing and speech impediments, autism and mild psychological challenges who live in state orphanages or come from underprivileged families living in poverty

CNCF ACCOUNTABILITY

CNCF is fully responsible for funding and financial management. CNCF provides management and technical support for childcare development and all project services

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

CNCF's Programme Manager conducts monthly visits to the Tay Ninh Residential Centre (TNRC) for monitoring children's development and safeguarding. Scheduled and unscheduled visits to TNRC are also facilitated by CNCF's Senior Projects Manager throughout the year. Regular meetings with the local partners and Tay Ninh Centre staff are held to provide project updates and to discuss any challenges. CNCF TNRC staff also attend weekly meetings with the Board of Management. Timely support is provided when specific needs arise. Monthly, quarterly, and semi-annual reports are provided to CNCF Board of Management. Annual evaluation is conducted by DOLISA and CNCF to assess project effectiveness. An annual report of the TNRC programme is also made available to all stakeholders

Established by CNCF Founder Christina Noble in 1999, the Tay Ninh Residential Centre for Visually Impaired Children (TNRC) responds to the pressing needs of visually impaired children from impoverished backgrounds or orphaned in Tay Ninh province. Situated in the rural challenges, including visual impairments due to Agent Orange exposure.

The centre functions as both a residential and educational facility, providing holistic long-term care, education, healthcare, and vocational training for up to 65 visually impaired children and young adults. Services include comprehensive healthcare with personal medical insurance, regular health check-ups, and tailored nutritional plans. Educational opportunities are paramount, with efforts to overcome social stigmas and ensure equal access to education, including Braille conversion of lessons. Vocational training includes computer classes and various vocational skills development programmes. Extra-curricular activities, such as library access, music lessons, and recreational outings, enrich the children's experiences. The TNRC emphasises personal and social skills development through rehabilitation classes, life skills training, and social skill development initiatives. Staff training and workshops ensure the consistent delivery of high-quality care and education, underscoring the TNRC's commitment to empowering visually impaired children to reach their full potential and integrate into society.

In 2023, the Tay Ninh Residential Centre (TNRC) continued to provide specialised shelter, healthcare, mainstream education, special needs education, vocational training, rehabilitation in mobility skills, life skills training, job placements, and recreational activities for children and young adults



Born into a farming family living in abject poverty in Tay Ninh Province, Khoa's early life was marked by challenges, including his struggle with complete blindness. Minh's parents faced challenges not only in providing meals for the family, but also in affording the specialised care Minh urgently needed. Despite these obstacles, his journey at the centre since his arrival in 2005 has been marked by significant growth and accomplishment, owing to the security, assistance, and opportunities for education, music, and extracurricular activities provided.

Minh's commitment to his education and passion for the arts through the centre have led to notable successes, including academic excellence and multiple awards for his achievements, underscoring his role as a beacon of inspiration within our community. Thanks to CNCF, he could pursue his love for music, honing his skills to the extent that he graduated from the Ho Chi Minh City Conservatory of Music in 2023, all made achievable through his determination and talent and financial support through CNCF's Education Scholarship Programme. Minh now shares his talents as a Music Teacher, impacting the lives of others at the Nhat Hong Centre for the Blind.

Minh's journey from a child facing significant obstacles to an influential and independent educator is a powerful testament to the impact of dedicated support and the indomitable human spirit. His story highlights the incredible possibilities that emerge when we nurture potential and foster resilience at the Tay Ninh Centre.
