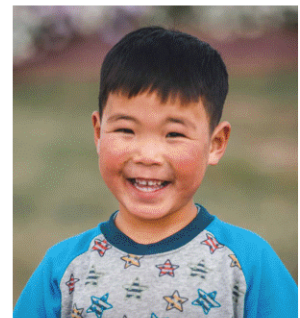
MISSION

Our achievements include significant milestones: many students gaining university admission both locally and overseas, graduates from our child sponsorship programme entering an ethical and safe workforce, and numerous accolades received by our children for their multifaceted achievements. These aren't just statistics or isolated successes; they're the building blocks of systemic change.

Christina Noble OBE is a staunch unorthodox champion of children's rights. Born in 1944 in the slums of Dublin, Ireland, Christina faced adversity from an early age. Following the death of her mother, Christina spent her childhood in dire circumstances, surviving years spent in poverty, industrial schools and orphanages. Christina knows first-hand what it is like to be denied her basic human rights, to be isolated, marginalised and to survive on the streets. This adversity in her young life instilled in her a lifelong passion for children's rights.

Arriving in Vietnam in 1989, Christina saw thousands of children roaming the streets in extreme poverty after the horrific effects of a decades-long war. Christina knew she had to do something to help these children. The Christina Noble Children's Foundation (CNCF) was later established, and to this day, continues to support many of Vietnam's most vulnerable children and communities across education, healthcare and community development.

In 1997, Christina travelled to Mongolia and saw first-hand the deprivation and poverty left behind after the withdrawal of the Soviet Union and the socio-economic collapse of the country, where children roamed the streets in their thousands, seeking food and shelter from the bitterly cold winters of -30 degrees and down in the sewers, manholes below the city streets. Christina expanded CNCF's operations to help the thousands of children forced to live on the dilapidated, freezing streets of Ulaanbaatar.

OUR HISTORY

The Christina Noble Children's Foundation (CNCF) was formally established in 1991 in Ho Chi Minh City, followed by the launch of Mongolia Operations Centre in Ulaanbaatar in 1997. CNCF is one of the longest-serving foreign NGOs in Vietnam and Mongolia.

Since its inception, the Christina Noble's Children Foundation has established over 170 projects across Vietnam and Mongolia, directly assisted over 900,000 children living in poverty and benefited the lives of well over one million people altogether. As the world evolves, so too does CNCF, now a third generation, family foundation. CNCF is also now actively supported and driven by Vietnamese and Mongolian community leaders, who for some were once supported by the Foundation as disadvantaged children. The Foundation's unwavering efforts to highlight the plight of children in need globally, continues to assist in motivating social change in Vietnam and Mongolia and has in turn inspired shifts in attitudes towards services provided to street and working children.



HOLISTIC

CNCF's holistic approach to childhood development is at the core of our work and inspires a depth of care that goes beyond the fulfilment of basic physical needs. Our programmes are designed to nurture young people in a way that recognises them as individuals requiring unique levels of care, both physical and emotional, and values their very special human spirit.



GRASS-ROOTS

CNCF's programmes address poverty at a grassroots level with a long-term focus on providing a nurturing and stimulating environment for all round personal development. CNCF works at the coalface in the extreme and dire circumstances the vulnerable children and families in our care experience. We remain on the ground to ensure every child has access to critical, high-quality care by providing residential and outreach support to all those in need.

WHERE WE WORK

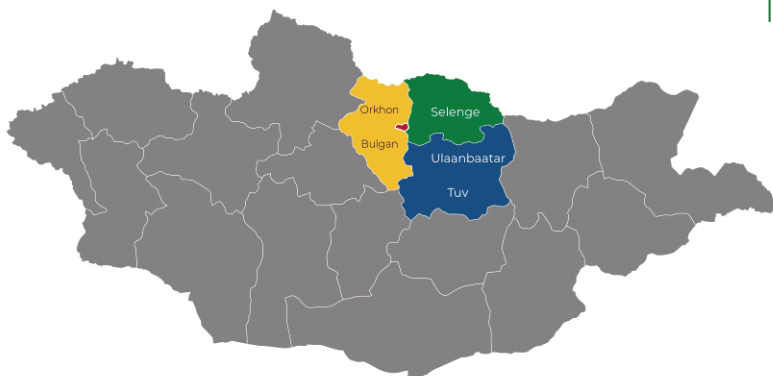

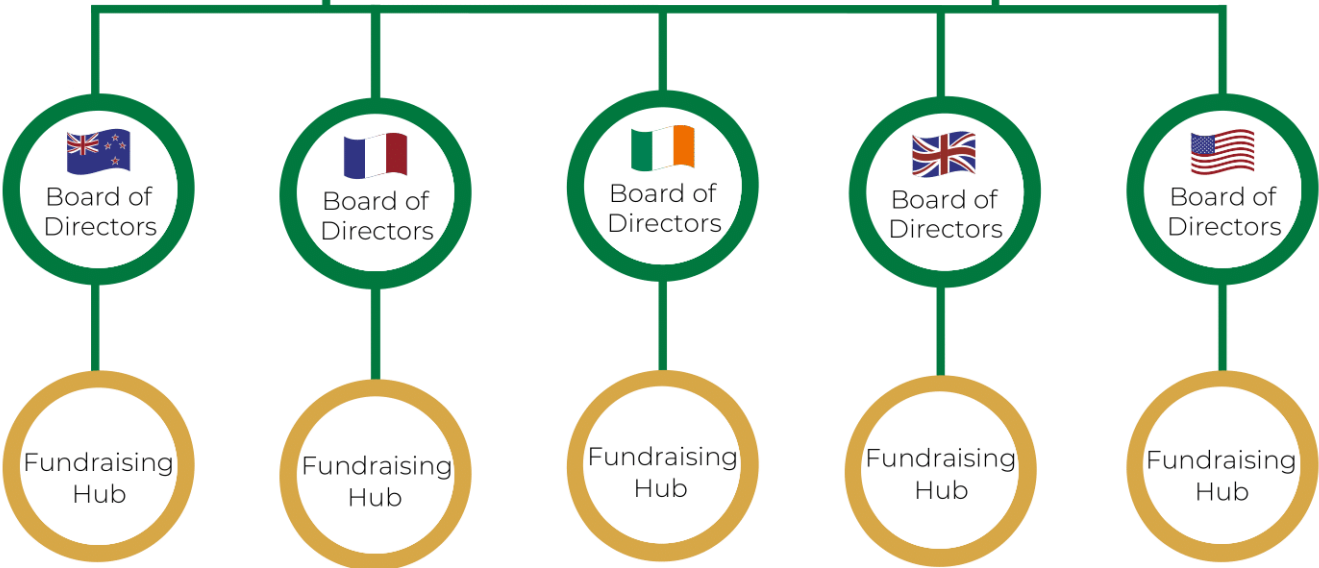

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

In 2022, CNCF launched the **Youth Enhancement and Career Guidance Programme in Vietnam**, a youth employability enhancement and career-readiness pilot project in the most southern tip of Vietnam, a province in the Mekong Delta - Ca Mau. The programme aims to best prepare disadvantaged rural youth living in poverty for school-to-school or school-to-work transition and navigates a pathway to an employment trajectory that eventually leads to an improved independent livelihood. We also established the **Christina Noble – Fulbright Scholarships** with valued new partners Fulbright University Vietnam, working towards our shared values and vision of improving the quality of educational opportunities provided to promising and exceptional students who come from significantly disadvantaged backgrounds.

In **Mongolia**, we launched a series of **Psychology Pilot Programme**, including the **BayARTai programme** and **We Are Future Psychologists project**. CNCF's Psychology Pilot Programme seeks to empower traumatised children through life-transforming Art Therapy services, enabling them to sustainably heal and flourish, as well as enhancing the standards of healthcare in Mongolia through training university students studying psychology with internationally recognised practical methods.

As part of a series of celebrations commencing **CNCF Mongolia's landmark 25th Anniversary** this year, CNCF organised **a special celebration for our children** at CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village, hosted by our children. It was a day filled with love, laughter, and great joy as the children delighted guests with performances, including traditional Mongolian song and dance, Contortionists, Taekwondo and Ukulele performances.

The milestone was further signified with **a Gala event**, aiming to raise crucial awareness on the Foundation's life-transforming work for vulnerable children and their communities and raise funds for the construction of a new building for **Mongolia's first free-of-charge Montessori Kindergarten**. The event received strong community and overseas support and was attended by Ambassadors and Dignitaries, leaders of local and overseas business and entertainment community, CNCF corporate and non-profit partners, and friends and family of the Foundation. **We extend our sincerest gratitude** to everyone who sponsored and supported our Gala event making it a truly memorable and successful occasion; without such gallant efforts and kind contributions we could not have put on such a magnificent event.

CNCF is also delighted to announce the appointment of its new Country Director Vietnam, Mr. Nha Nguyen Thanh. With many years in the International Development sector, Mr. Nha has extensive experience in senior project management with multiple international development aid agencies and non-governmental organisations. Mr. Nha's unwavering passion and commitment, on behalf of CNCF, will continue to create quality and lasting equal opportunities to disadvantaged children and youth in Vietnam.

CNCF AND THE UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) provide a universal framework for collaboration and action towards global challenges, to achieve a more sustainable and equitable future for all. CNCF is contributing to the SDGs, in particular the goals listed below:



CNCF's programmes address poverty at a grassroots level, encompassing the provision of housing, sustainable livelihoods, and the resolution of immediate necessities, alongside fulfilling other fundamental needs

57 CHILDREN AND 30 ADULTS were supported with a warm and secure ger (traditional Mongolian home) of their own, and as a result have been able to flourish in a safe and stimulating environment in 2022.

28 FAMILIES in rural areas of Southern Vietnam were provided with microfinance loan to build livelihoods and start business.

68 CHILDREN & ADULTS in need received special and emergency financial assistance for urgent housing repairs, emergency healthcare needs, food, clothes, firewood and coal, and unique opportunities for children's personal development.

3,900 HOME VISITS to children and families were conducted by CNCF staff.



In 2022, CNCF continued supporting children in our care by providing nutritious meals and addressing food insecurity

419 CHILDREN residing at CNCF's residential facilities or enrolled at our day-care/ kindergartens received daily nutritional support. **Over 400,000 nutritious meals** were served.

1,891 KILOGRAMMES OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES were harvested at CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village through the Horticulture programme.



We focus on improving access to healthcare, including check-ups, medical treatments, rehabilitation and preventive care. In 2022,

2,310 CHILDREN AND ADULTS received healthcare assistance and health check-ups.

7,947 HEALTH CHECK-UPS AND TREATMENTS were provided by CNCF Doctors.

290 CHILDREN AND ADULTS in need received psychological support from CNCF Psychologists.

387 HEALTH TALKS AND TRAININGS were facilitated for children.



CNCF is committed to providing access to quality education to vulnerable children. This year,

2,214 CHILDREN were supported to engage in education.

542 CHILDREN graduated from Kindergarten, Primary School, Secondary School, High School, Vocational Programmes, Institutes, College, Intermediates, and University.

58 CHILDREN in need were provided with bicycles to transport to and from school.

463 CHILDREN participated in CNCF's Arts, Music, and Sports Programme for a well-rounded education.

819 CHILDREN benefitted from CNCF's newly built child-friendly libraries in Hau Giang Province, Vietnam.

973 CHILDREN attended **114 life skills training and workshops**.



In 2022, we continued promoting gender equality by ensuring that both girls and boys have equal access to education, healthcare, and opportunities to thrive.

94 GIRLS were provided with holistic support at CNCF's residential facilities.

1,057 GIRLS were supported to enrol and remain in school.



CNCF works towards providing clean water and sanitation facilities to communities in need. In 2022,

24 CHILDREN AND 72 ADULTS in remote and rural areas in the Mekong Delta, Vietnam were provided with access to clean water through newly built water tanks, improving hygiene practices and preventing waterborne diseases.



This year, we continued working towards reducing inequalities by providing equal opportunities for children and young adults, regardless of their background.

60 CHILDREN were holistically supported by CNCF's Tay Ninh Centre for Visually Impaired Children. Among them, 30 children are completely or partially blind, and 26 children have additional disabilities.

61 CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS at the Rehabilitation Centre for Youth in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia were provided with access to education, skills training, and personal development opportunities to develop and reiterate back into their community.



CNCF collaborates with international and local partners, governments, and stakeholders to enhance impact and create sustainable solutions for vulnerable communities. In 2022,

CNCF worked with government partners in **20 cities and provinces** across Vietnam and Mongolia. We continued initiating new partnerships and maintaining our existing partnerships with businesses, schools, organisations, and institutions.

Child Sponsorship Programme

Mongolia & Vietnam

CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme (est. 1997) provides financial and social support to children and their families living in extreme poverty. The monthly financial sponsorship covers the costs of education including tuition fees, school supplies, uniforms, and transportation to and from school as well as food, clothes, and extracurricular activities when needed. Children and their families also received medical and psychological assistance as well as additional self-development support. Since inception, 52,330 children and young adults have been supported to remain in school and further their education.

A TESTIMONY TO THE POWER OF SPONSORSHIP

Yet, with unwavering financial, social, and psychological support from CNCF and his kind Sponsor, along with his own determination and resilience, Sainaa continued his education beyond high school. Not only did he excel academically, but he also emerged as a leader among his peers, actively participating in various CNCF activities, notably the Noble Club, a community service group where young individuals enrolled in CNCF's Programmes give back to the community and contribute to the development of Mongolia. Sainaa's pursuit of a Law degree at university led to great success, and he's now a thriving lawyer. His remarkable journey is a testament to hard work, the kindness of others, and its impact on a child's life.

When 9-year-old Sainaa* first joined CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme, he faced the risk of school disengagement due to his family's financial hardships. Their dwelling was on the verge of collapse, with his visually impaired father and unemployed mother struggling to make ends meet on his father's limited disability allowance. Tragically, after his father's passing and his mother's descent into alcoholism, Sainaa had to take on the immense responsibility of caring for both himself and his mother.

Education Scholarship Programme

Mongolia & Vietnam

CNCF's Education Scholarship Programme (est. 2001) provides financial support in the form of education scholarships to young people pursuing higher education and students who want to continue their studies but do not have the financial means to. Additional support in the form of guidance, career counselling, personal development activities and life skills training is also provided, ensuring students are able to reach their fullest potential in their education and future career. To date, the Education Scholarship Programme has supported 6,861 students to continue their schooling and pursue tertiary education.

ACHIEVING SUCCESS THROUGH DETERMINATION AND RESILIENCE

Khuyen* lost her father at a young age and was raised by her grandparents. When her grandparents passed away, she sought shelter with her uncle. Khuyen had to take on varied part-time jobs to support her own expenses. Despite the challenges, her academic brilliance shone through.

Excelling in her studies from secondary to high school, Khuyen gained admission to the prestigious University of Technology Ho Chi Minh City, studying Industrial and Systems Engineering. Khuyen was then enrolled in CNCF's Education Scholarship Programme for financial and social support to pursue her tertiary education. As one of the few female engineering students, Khuyen distinguished herself with excellent academic results and active participation in extracurricular activities. She also volunteered as a translator at CNCF, impressing everyone with her language proficiency, professionalism, and exceptional communication skills.

Upon graduation, Khuyen successfully secured a job at Unilever, one of the largest transnational corporations. CNCF is proud of Khuyen's accomplishments and will continue supporting talented individuals like her in their pursuit of educational excellence.

Rehabilitation Centre For Youth Education Programme

Mongolia

CNCF's Rehabilitation Centre For Youth Education Programme (formerly named Boys' Prison Education Programme) (est. 1997) provides a supportive environment for educational, vocational and social development, facilitating a fresh start for vulnerable young people at the Centre who have mostly committed poverty-driven petty theft crimes. The programme plays an important role in the fundamental shift of a penal system from an exclusive focus on punishment and condemnation to a more empowering and progressive system of education and rehabilitation. Since inception, 1,319 young people have been supported by the Rehabilitation Centre For Youth Education Programme.

Blue Skies Kindergarten

Mongolia

CNCF's Blue Skies Kindergarten (est. 2000) provides early education, healthcare, nutritional and emotional support to young children who are residents of CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village and children living in the surrounding SonginoKhairkhan district area, Ulaanbaatar. To date, the Blue Skies Kindergarten remains the only free kindergarten in the local district, supporting the well-rounded education of 1,433 children and laying the groundwork for their Primary School education.

Bicycle Support Programme

Vietnam

CNCF's Bicycle Support Programme (est. 2004) provides children, who are unable to afford safe transportation to school due to financial hardship and thereby at high risk of educational disengagement, with a quality bicycle of their own. The programme helps to improve a child's educational outcomes by increasing access to school, and a family's economic outcomes by reducing transportation costs. To date, over 2,000 bicycles have been distributed to children in need.

Since inception, over 8,600 children have been empowered with the opportunity to heal and thrive through the programme.

CNCF's Sports Programme (est. 1997) provides children from disadvantaged and poverty-stricken backgrounds, with the sports and extracurricular activities that they would otherwise not have access to, to support their physical health, psychological wellbeing, and social development. Classes include Taekwondo, Judo, Swimming, Cricket, Archery, Basketball, Volleyball, and Football. The Sports Programme has supported over 5,000 children to explore their sporting potential and enrich their physical health and wellbeing.

HEALTHCARE

Healthcare Programme

Mongolia

The Healthcare Programme (est. 1997) provides children in CNCF care and vulnerable community children with complimentary and professional medical check-ups, treatments and emergency care. On-site treatments for mild to moderate health conditions are provided by CNCF Doctors, whilst children with complex conditions are referred to a secondary or tertiary level hospital for specialised diagnosis and treatment (financial assistance is provided to ensure children are able to receive the emergency treatments they desperately need). To date, the Healthcare Programme has supported 11,594 children and families to develop healthily and provided them with a safe foundation to grow and flourish in life.

Medical Assistance Programme

Vietnam

CNCF's Medical Assistance Programme (est. 1999) provides financial support to children (up to age 16) from varied provinces in Vietnam who travel to Ho Chi Minh City for emergency medical treatments that they are otherwise unable to afford. The financial assistance helps alleviate the family's burden of treatment costs for life-saving surgical procedures, post-operative care, basic medical treatments, social support and health insurance. Since its inception, 2,425 children have been supported with medical assistance for emergency surgeries and medical treatments they desperately need to develop into healthy individuals.

CNCF's Medical Exchange Programme (est. 2004) in partnership with Operation Childlife and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland was established with an aim to bring world-class medical expertise to Vietnam and Mongolia in the form of medical delegations that assess difficult medical cases, and perform surgeries that were otherwise unavailable in Mongolia and Vietnam. The programme also brings key local Vietnamese medical staff to Ireland for intensive surgical training that they can apply in their home hospitals. To date, CNCF's Medical Exchange Programme has supported 1,118 children, of which, 584 children have been provided with life-saving surgeries giving them another chance at life. 28 doctors from Children's Hospital No. 2, Vietnam have also been facilitated to travel to Ireland for intensive surgical training at Our Lady's Children's Hospital, Dublin.

Sunshine Social and Medical Centre

Vietnam

The Sunshine Social and Medical Centre (SSMC) (est. 1991) is a CNCF's flagship project providing dedicated life-transforming residential healthcare, nutritional care, physiotherapy-based rehabilitation, psychosocial care, pre-school education, and day-care services to babies and children ages 0 to 6 who are orphaned, abandoned, or come from impoverished families. Medical treatments are also provided to surrounding communities through a range of community outreach trips.

Since inception, CNCF's Sunshine Social & Medical Centre has provided 1,649 vulnerable children with full-time residential care; 2,463 children with day care services and early childhood education at our kindergarten and 191,321 children with free examinations and treatments at our outpatient clinic and through our outreach programme.

THRIVING UNDER THE CARE OF SSMC

Baby Son* was born in December 2018 and arrived at CNCF's Sunshine Social and Medical Centre from an orphanage on the outskirts of Ho Chi Minh City in May 2020. Prior to her arrival, Son had suffered from pneumonia, bronchitis, otitis media, and motor delays. On arrival to SSMC she still suffered from bronchitis, severe malnutrition and was diagnosed with cerebral palsy.

Based on CNCF's comprehensive assessment, the medical team applied a rehabilitation plan for Son including measures for nutrition recovery, disease precaution and treatment, physical therapy interventions, and positive language interventions.

CNCF is thrilled that with time thanks to the team at SSMC, Son's health began to significantly improve and she has now recovered from malnutrition and her other curable health conditions, she can stand, walk and knows her name. CNCF is now working to help further support Son to develop and reach her physical and mental potential.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Blue Skies Ger Village

Mongolia

CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village (est. 1997) provides both temporary shelter and permanent housing to children who are orphaned, living on the streets or are otherwise unable to stay at home due to a high risk of neglect, abuse, exploitation, trafficking, and threats of violence. The Ger Village provides residential care, healthcare, psychological rehabilitation, academic education, vocational training, personal and life skills development, and extracurricular activities for children to thrive and develop. Since inception, The Blue Skies Ger Village has supported 1,289 children with comprehensive childcare services and opportunities to reach their fullest potential and become productive members of society.

TRANSFORMING THROUGH UNCONDITIONAL CARE

Bataa* arrived at CNCF's Blue Skies Ger Village at the age of four. He was found in a freezing ger (traditional Mongolian home) without food or care for several days, abandoned by his parents struggling with alcohol addiction. Upon his arrival, Bataa struggled with his health and speech; he was unable to speak and suffered from severe malnutrition and rickets, making it difficult for him to open his eyes or walk.

With two years of dedicated treatment, Bataa gradually overcame malnutrition and rickets. His eyes are no longer sensitive to light, and he can walk confidently. Bataa now attends a special needs school, and receives individualised therapy from CNCF Psychologists to develop his language skills. His progress has been remarkable, as he has learned to comprehend conversations, read, write, count, and draw beautifully. In the past two years, Bataa's ability to speak has improved significantly, and he can now clearly articulate two to three words.

With ongoing care and support from the Blue Skies Ger Village team, Bataa now has an opportunity for a brighter future. His story serves as a testament to the power of unconditional compassion and dedication in helping children overcome adversity and thrive.

Sunshine Homes

Vietnam

CNCF's Sunshine Home for Boys (est. 1994) and Sunshine Home for Girls (est. 1997) provide a caring home environment where orphaned, abandoned or children from highly vulnerable circumstances are safe and empowered with access to residential care, healthcare, academic education, vocational training, personal and life skills development, and extracurricular activities to lead independent and fulfilling lives. To date, the Sunshine Homes have provided 1,296 children including 760 boys and 536 girls with holistic child-centred support and a sustainable future.

Tay Ninh Residential Centre for Visually Impaired Children

Vietnam

Located in Tay Ninh Province, CNCF's Tay Ninh Residential Centre for Visually Impaired Children (est. 1999) functions as both a residential home and educational centre providing children with visual impairments and other disabilities with residential care, nutrition support, healthcare, education, rehabilitation, and vocational and life skills training. To date, the Tay Ninh Centre remains the only facility offering comprehensive care to an underserved and often overlooked population of visually impaired children in the province, assisting 1,525 children and young adults to become self-sufficient and independent individuals.



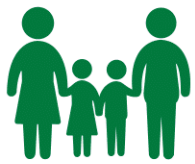

Mongolia

To date, the Give-a-Ger Programme has supported 941 families with a high quality and comfortable ger of their own, enabling the families to flourish in a safe environment free from all forms of threats and able to rebuild their lives.

ACCOUNTABILITY TO OUR CHILDREN

Safeguarding Children

At CNCF, we strictly adhere to Child Protection Policies when working with some of the world's most vulnerable children. Due to the challenges posed by the cultural context of the communities we work in and the hostile environments some of our children come from, the measures we take to ensure the children's wellbeing must be solid and relevant to the different settings.

Visitors Policy

CNCF is committed to transparency, and we welcome visitors to observe our work firsthand. All visitors are required to sign terms and conditions, and are accompanied by authorised CNCF management staff during their visit.

Child Protection

All CNCF employees and volunteers must read and sign our Child Protection Policies as part of their employment contract. We ensure all CNCF members know how to respond to child safety concerns and encourage reporting of any misconduct to the Board of Management.

Photography Policy

For the safety and privacy of our children, photography is only allowed with authorised CNCF management approval. No images of our children or beneficiaries can be made public without the consent of CNCF, and dissemination must not infringe upon a person's rights, privacy, integrity, or dignity.

ACCOUNTABILITY TO OUR PROGRAMMES

CNCF adopts an inclusive approach to programme evaluation, involving all stakeholders including project management staff, local partners, project staff, CNCF children, and their parents/guardians. This ensures diverse perspectives, fosters knowledge sharing, and strengthens evaluation capacity. We conduct comprehensive assessments on both policies and management challenges, combining process evaluation and impact evaluation to identify issues early on and facilitate adaptive programme changes based on community needs. Impact is measured using both qualitative and quantitative metrics.

ACCOUNTABILITY TO OUR PARTNERS AND DONORS

We aim to maintain high levels of accountability and transparency in our operations through strict evaluation and reporting procedures. For CNCF-operated programmes, budget control is assigned to the accountant, project managers, and finance manager, ensuring thorough oversight and monthly review. Similarly, for programmes operated by our local partners, financial monitoring is rigorous, with monthly reports and budget analysis provided.

We are committed to transparency with all our donors, providing details on fund usage and in-kind gifts and sharing the progress stories of our children and communities whilst respecting their privacy. We have an open-door policy, welcoming community members to learn more about our work. We only collaborate with partners aligned with our values and responsibly handle surplus donations, directing them to local underfunded orphanages and centres.

OUR POLICY



Health and Safety

We prioritise the health, safety, and security of our children and staff, providing them with social and health insurance. Volunteers and interns are required to be insured in their countries of residence before they begin work with CNCF and vaccinated against communicable diseases and infections. During outbreaks, affected children are quarantined, and our Centres are closed to visitors, volunteers, and project office staff whilst our medical teams take necessary precautions. Additionally, all staff undergo compulsory annual health check-ups.



Cyber Protection Policy

In response to cybersecurity threats and digital fraud, we introduce new payment processes, a crisis response plan, and enhanced security measures for our electronic systems. We appreciate the ongoing support of law firms and information technology/cybersecurity consultants in implementing these policies.



Privacy Policy

We are committed to protecting the privacy of personal information, and our updated Privacy Policy explains data protection practices and supporter choices. The current version of the policy is available on our website. (www.cncf.org)



Communications

We maintain regular communication with our staff, encouraging open dialogue through meetings and conferences. Our leadership team conducts weekly conference meetings, and partner office Boards of Directors meet regularly. We use English and local languages for internal communication and update our website and social media with news and updates.



Fire Safe

Regular fire safety checks and drills are conducted by the local Fire Departments to ensure the safety of our staff and children.



Anti-corruption Policies

We have stringent anti-corruption policies in place, requiring all staff, including board members, managers, and volunteers, to understand and report any misconduct and malpractice.



Security

Security is paramount at all our centres and programmes, with cameras, guards, and sign-in/out procedures for all visitors.



In 2022, to deliver our project services, fundraise, maintain profile and operate in accordance with good governance, our Foundation relied on **269** staff and volunteers. **120** staff in our operational projects and office in Vietnam; and **67** staff and **7** volunteers in our operational projects and office in Mongolia. We had **23** staff and **52** volunteers in CNCF fundraising partner offices; **34** non-executive (voluntary) Directors who serve on the head CNCF International Board and **6** respective global fundraising boards who operate under their own legal jurisdictions.

To keep our children safe, we prioritise professional standards for all employees and volunteers. Our hiring process includes thorough vetting and probation periods. We support a healthy work-life balance and offer flexibility when possible. Training and development are essential, with regular assessments and orientations covering child protection, cultural sensitivity, and safety. Our diverse global team includes local nationals in Vietnam and Mongolia, and we actively encourage people with physical disabilities and CNCF graduates to apply for employment positions within our Foundation. We also believe that localising the local leadership of the Foundation and utilising the talent of our local staff makes our Foundation and our impact in the community more sustainable.

OUR PARTNERSHIPS AND PARTNERS

OUR PARTNERSHIPS

CNCF collaborates with diverse institutions, receiving grants that support our projects and capacity building initiatives for long-term sustainability. These partnerships also contribute to raising awareness about our Foundation's work. Acceptance does not impair our independent pursuit of our mission, compromise or endanger our integrity and reputation. We endeavour to build long-term close relationships with our partners and supporters through transparency and accountability throughout the different stages of our partnerships.

CNCF works with corporate partners who share in our mission of supporting vulnerable children and communities in Vietnam and Mongolia. Our corporate partners also view the collaboration with us as a meaningful way to engage their employees, clients, and consumers.

Our Schools Visits Programme helps students learn the importance of service. It also aims to promote an understanding of the types of issues and difficulties that some of the most disadvantaged members of our global community face. CNCF also partners with educational institutions to promote capacity building of our local partners. For example, our Medical Exchange Programme aims to bring paediatric surgery in Vietnam and Mongolia up to international standards. This programme was established by CNCF in 2004 together with Professor Martin Corbally of Operation ChildLife and medical teams from the Royal College of Surgeons Ireland (RCSI) and Bahrain (RCSB).
