PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

LOCATION

District 10, Ho Chi Minh City (HCMC), Vietnam

OBJECTIVES

To provide a safe and caring environment for boys and girls who are either from very poor families or were living on the streets and were at high risk of commercial and sexual exploitation, drug trafficking, and violence. The Homes aim to provide a safe haven, a place where the children are looked after in a nurturing and loving environment and receive psychological counselling, healthcare, education, and vocational training so they can live independently in the community when they are adults.

PROGRAMME COMPONENTS Residential Care; Healthcare; Rehabilitation; Education; Vocational and Life Skills Training.

BENEFICIARIES

Children (ages 5–20 years) from disadvantaged backgrounds including children from poor families whose parents/guardians cannot support them, orphans, abandoned children, children living on the streets and those who have faced or are at high risk of commercial and sexual exploitation, drug trafficking, and violence.

MONITORING AND **EVALUATION**

Because CNCF is directly responsible for financial management and funding, the CNCF Programme Manager conducts official monitoring visits at least once every two weeks. Children in the Homes also participate in other CNCF programmes such as Sunshine Arts & Music and Sports Programmes, and the responsible Programme Managers receive regular updates about the children through their project activities. In addition, information and updates about the children are collected through project visits (scheduled and unscheduled) and timely support in different areas is provided when necessary. Meetings with local partners and/or staff at the Homes are held to provide project updates and resolve any issues. Weekly internal meetings are conducted for CNCF staff to discuss programme related issues and updates. Monthly, quarterly, and semi-annual reports are sent by CNCF staff to the Board of Management. An end of year evaluation is conducted by DOLISA and CNCF to assess project results and an Annual Report is published.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2018, the Sunshine Homes continued to provide a nurturing home for boys and girls in need and access to tools to help them achieve their goals and build better, brighter futures. The Sunshine Homes provide a safe, loving home environment to street children and children who have been abandoned or subjected to abuse.

In 2019, the Sunshine Homes will continue to maintain a safe, loving and stimulating environment where our children can continue to flourish. We aim to maintain the quality of existing services and facilities and provide additional support when possible.

The total cost of running the Sunshine Home for Boys in 2018 was USD \$38,747.58 and the total cost of running the Sunshine Home for Girls in 2018 was USD \$32,849.83.

PROGRAMME BACKGROUND

Christina Noble founded the Sunshine Home for Boys in 1994 to provide a safe and caring shelter for street boys who were at risk of starvation, commercial exploitation, and drug trafficking and who were living under the threat of violence. The Sunshine Home for Girls was opened in partnership with the Women's Association of HCMC in 1997. Before we gave them a safe haven, the girls, mostly runaways from abusive homes or troubled girls forced to live on the streets due to extreme poverty, were at constant risk of starvation and sexual and commercial exploitation.

Thanks to the support of our donors and sponsors, we have been able to provide the children of HCMC a nurturing home that provides them the tools to achieve their goals and build better, brighter futures. The Sunshine Homes provide a safe, loving home environment where the children receive regular, nutritious meals and clean clothing. All children are sent to school and/or receive vocational training, depending on their age and ability. Those undertaking vocational training choose from a wide range of apprenticeship courses suited to their individual interests. We also encourage the children to develop their sport and artistic abilities through our Sports and Arts and Music Programmes. The Sunshine Home for Boys can accommodate up to 25 boys at a time and the Sunshine Home for Girls can accommodate up to 20 girls.

In more than twenty years of operation, the Sunshine Homes have provided a sustainable future for 1,114 children, 655 boys and 459 girls. By providing them a safe home and a foundation to build upon in their formative years, our children have developed the confidence, life skills, and self-belief they need to reintegrate back into the community and lead independent lives.

It is only because of the generous support of donors like you that we can continue to provide boys and girls the support they need to grow into happy and productive adults.

Through 2018, the Girls' Sunshine Home staff and volunteers continued to be united in their mission to improve the lives of children. We had a strong academic year which we are delighted with. We are very proud of our girls who have worked especially hard this year, as we continue to reinforce the message that education is the key for an independent sustainable future ahead. Thank you to all our donors and volunteers who support our life-changing work with the children.

PROGRAMME ACTIVITIES

Healthcare

All children at the Sunshine Homes are covered under the national healthcare programme and receive healthcare that includes:

- Annual health check-ups and recording of medical conditions
- Regular monitoring and timely medical care
- General health and hygiene training

Annual health check-ups and recording of medical conditions

In 2018, 21 boys and 16 girls received an annual check-up at a government hospital. All children were dewormed. Eight girls were infected with Helicobacter pylori. Two children were diagnosed with chronic adenoids and one child each had elevated liver enzymes, ovarian cysts, kidney stones, and anaemia. Two children were vaccinated against hepatitis B.

Regular monitoring and timely medical care

The staff at our Sunshine Homes regularly monitor and evaluate the children's health. Children receive nutritious meals every day and the staff monitor living conditions closely to keep the facility neat and hygienic. When health concerns arise, the staff ensures the children receive appropriate and timely medical care.

Health and hygiene awareness and training

Staff members at the Homes conduct health-related sharing sessions covering topics such as common diseases and prevention and puberty and related nutritional needs. The children are encouraged, discuss their concerns with others, and seek their own solutions.

Specific topics covered in sharing sessions in 2018 were hand-foot-and-mouth disease, sexual abuse, menstruation and puberty, seasonal disease, and personal hygiene.





During the 2017–2018 academic year, 20 girls and 21 boys from the Sunshine Homes enrolled in local schools at different levels. Most of the schools are close to the Homes so the children can walk or ride to school. Academic performance was strong with only two girls performing below expectations. Children who score below average are provided with extra tutoring and support.

Children who join the Homes in the middle of an academic year receive support to enrol in school for the next academic year. Children are provided with information and consultation about continuing education opportunities in suitable vocational courses when they complete mainstream education.

This year, an English class was organised with help of volunteers to help children develop their speaking and comprehension skills.

Personal and Social Skills Development

CNCF recognises the importance of personal and social skills in child development. Thus, we provide boys and girls living in the Sunshine Homes comprehensive skills training so they can learn to care for themselves and interact successfully with others.

At our Sunshine Homes, children take part in training and sharing sessions focusing on issues related to behavioural development, attitude, and modern social problems. Our children also learn from real situations during excursions and outdoor activities.

Recreational Activities

A fun and engaging childhood is important for comprehensive development of children, and thus, we focus on giving the boys and girls at our Sunshine Homes the chance to choose from a range of activities. Through our Arts and Music and Sports Programmes, we organised regular extracurricular classes and seasonal activities that were easily accessible to all children.

The Girls' Home staff organised mini-sessions using computers provided by GAP last year to teach computer skills such as Word and Excel. Additional training was provided in use of the internet for research. Children continued to have access to in-house services including the library.

Arts, Music, and Sports Participation



Social Skills Development

Boys and girls living in our Sunshine Homes are given opportunities to interact socially with local and international visitors. Most social interaction occurs during play and organised activities in which the children can establish a sense of self and learn what others expect from them. In addition to improving their social behaviour, the children also improve their communication, cognitive, and motor skills and learn about other cultures.

Sunshine Homes children also take part in social events and interact with CNCF staff, volunteers, interns, and donors on special occasions such as Children's Day, Mid-Autumn Festival, Tet, and Christmas.

OUR STORIES

From Homeless to Hope

Ngan's* father ran away when she was a little girl and left her mother to support their family alone. Their life was very difficult because Ngan's mother had mental health problems and was unable hold down a job to support the family. They were homeless and spent most of their time in the train station before the local government intervened and sent Ngan to the Sunshine Home for Girls in 2010.

Ngan had an older brother who was already under the care of the Boys' Home. In 2018, he graduated from high school and passed the college entrance exams. He is entering a mechanical design course.

Ngan has flourished in the last eight years. She completed secondary school and eagerly attends English, dancing, and drawing classes organized by CNCF. Last year, she made good progress in her post-secondary studies and continues to perform well in high school. She is also a very responsible young adult and helps the Sunshine Home by serving as a mentor for the younger children. We are very proud of Ngan. Her resilience and strength embodies the CNCF spirit.

Difficult Beginnings, but a Bright Future

Dat* came from a poor and unhappy family. His mother ran away when he was only two and left Dat's father, who was in poor health, to support the family on his own. A paternal relative let them live in a corner of their house, but their relationship was not good. Sometimes, Dat and his father stayed on the street and begged strangers for money. Life was difficult, but Dat and his father loved each other and did not want to live separately. However, in 2016, when Dat was seven, his father, whose health was failing, decided to send Dat to the Sunshine Home for Boys so he could receive better care. A few months later, Dat's father passed away.

Dat is a strong boy. He hid his sadness and immersed himself in his studies. He achieved excellent results at school, but he did not smile often and rarely participated in recreational activities. After receiving care and love from the Home staff, especially from other brothers living in the Home, Dat opened up and started to talk more about his hobbies. In addition to school, Dat was highly enthusiastic about drawing class organised by CNCF. Last year, his artwork received a prize and was displayed at the art exhibition organised by the Fine Art Association in HCMC! Despite his difficult beginnings, Dat is well on his way to a bright future thanks to his strength and the love and support of the Sunshine Home.

From Humble Beginnings to Computer Whiz

Vinh's* parents divorced when he was a little boy and his mother worked as a domestic helper to support the family. Because her income was small and unreliable, she sent Vinh to the Sunshine Home for Boys when he was six years old in 2004.

At first, Vinh's only focus was to get back to his mom as soon as possible. However, because of the care and love he received at the Home, he gradually settled in and the shelter became his second home. He enjoyed playing with the other children in the Home and participating in extracurricular classes organised by CNCF. Most of all, he wanted to go to school and learn so he could build a brighter future. Because Chinese was his first language, Vinh struggled to read and speak Vietnamese. However, Vinh did not see language as an obstacle, instead he studied hard and ultimately graduated from high school in 2018. Now, he will attend a three-year internet technology programme. He is also working for a cyber centre as a manager and earns a good income. Vinh's start in life was rocky, but his future is limitless thanks to the support he received at the Sunshine Home for Boys.

Indirect costs include salaries of project staff, stationery, communication, transportation and accommodation, security fees, and electricity and water allocated to the project.
